Mammoths in Utah

When Utah's NHL team became the Utah Mammoth, many fans wondered what connection this Ice Age giant has with our state. The truth? Fossil evidence found around Utah proves that Columbian mammoths – the largest mammals of their time – once roamed this region during the Ice Age. Today, you can find fossil displays and discovery sites from Logan to St. George.

- Natural History Museum of Utah**

The museum's exhibits and collections feature mammoth skulls, tusks, teeth, and other fossils found throughout Utah.
- USU Museum of Geology**
4505 Old Main Hill, Logan
See a mammoth tusk and tooth on permanent display in the museum.
- Prehistoric Museum, USU Eastern**
155 E Main Street, Price
Real mammoth bones are on display, as well as a complete cast of the famous Huntington Mammoth.
- Mountain America Museum of Ancient Life at Thanksgiving Point**
2929 N Thanksgiving Way, Lehi
View a mammoth cast, mammoth hair, and a real baby mammoth skeleton.
- Utah Field House of Natural History State Park Museum**
496 E Main Street, Vernal
See a life-size replica of a woolly mammoth in the Dinosaur Garden outside the museum.
- Huntington Mammoth Site**
UT-31, Mount Pleasant
This is the discovery site of one of the most complete Columbian mammoths ever excavated.
- Museum of the San Rafael**
70 N 100 E, Castle Dale
View a Columbian mammoth skull, teeth, and femur.
- Frehner Museum of Natural History**
162 S 300 W, Cedar City
Part of a Columbian mammoth maxilla fossil, teeth, and tusk fragment are in the museum's collection.
- Fairview Museum of History & Art**
55 N 100 E, Fairview
Casts of a Columbian mammoth and mammoth bones are on permanent display.
- Dinosaur Discovery Site**
2180 E Riverside Drive, St. George
Mammoth fossils are on display and guests can take part in a mammoth scavenger hunt and other activities.
